



OUR DIRECTOR



IRENE ALBY

A Director/Actor, Irene Alby was a company member of The Other Theatre from 1997 to 1999 and performed in Kaspar, Year Zero and Human Collision/Atomic Reaction which was presented at the 1999 Festival de Théâtre des Amériques and won the Montreal English Critics Circle Award (M.E.C.C.A.) for "Best Direction" and "Best Production". Her New York credits include Aase in Peer Gynt directed by Andrei Serban, The Dancing Fox with the Mettawee River Theatre and Serban's Benvenuto Cellini at the NY Metropolitan Opera as well as performances at the Ohio Theatre Ice Factory Theatre Festival, the Producer's Club, St. Veronica's

Church and the Theatre of the Riverside Church. She also interned as an Assistant to Legit Agent, Meg Pantera.

Currently, she is a Teaching Assistant Professor at WVU Department of Theatre and Dance. She formerly taught for twelve years at the University of Toledo Department of Theatre and Film, where she was a Senior Lecturer. Her production of The Adding Machine was invited to tour to the 2015 KCACTF REGION II Festival, and she recently co-directed A Midsummer Night's Dream at Kookmin University in Seoul, Korea. She is a founding artist of the Glacity Theatre Collective (GTC), a professional theatre company in Toledo, Ohio, where she also served as the Managing Director throughout the company's first three years. GTC credits include directing Jenny Schwartz's God's Ear, and performing in Albee's Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, Laura Wade's Breathing Corpses and George F. Walker's Problem Child. Most recently, she performed Titania/Hyppolyta in A Midsummer Night's Mysteries, a collaboration with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra. This fall she directed Exit, Pursued by a Bear at WVU.

She received her MFA in Acting at Columbia University's School of the Arts, studying under Andrei Serban, Kristin Linklater, Anne Bogart and Nikolaus Wolcz, and her BFA in Theatre at Concordia University in Montreal. During that time, she also studied three years at the Ecole de Mime Omnibus and participated in Pol Pelletier's Dojo workshop.

FROM THE DIRECTOR...

It is with great excitement that we present to you A Christmas Carol 2.0! Every artist dreams of nothing more than a second opportunity to explore the depths of a great text, and collaborating with a team of highly talented artists, from cast and musicians, to crew and production team, has been an honor. I look forward to sharing our many discoveries with you and believe that we have some nice surprises in store for you this year!

All authors write for a contemporary audience, and Charles Dickens was no exception. A Christmas Carol first came out in 1843 as a social commentary against exploitation of children and the poor, as well as the importance of education. These themes remained central to Dickens' work throughout his life. As a 12-year-old child, he had been forced to work in a shoe polish factory for a year while his father was in prison for being unable to pay off debt. The experience marked him for life, and though he barely spoke about it, it is prevalent in all of his works. While there is debate as to how influential his work was on child labor laws, we do know for a fact that many new rules and regulations went into effect during those same years that he was writing. While setting the play in Victorian England, I have tried to maintain the contemporary spirit of the play to make it relevant to today's audiences.

The novel was an instant success and eight stage adaptations were already in production within only two months of publication. Throughout the remainder of his life, Dickens himself performed the story every Christmas to audiences across Europe and America. Like all great works, the message of the story rings out with as much relevance today as it did when it was written, and many of us (myself included) make the pilgrimage each year to hear those words performed in theatres across the country. We owe much of our own sense of nostalgia and tradition to Dickens' oeuvre. Christmas was waning in significance in the 1800s, but the publication revitalized the holiday and brought it back to its central place in Victorian England.

Lastly, we sometimes forget that A Christmas Carol is also great ghost story! Dickens introduced his book in this way:

"I have endeavored in this ghostly little book, to raise the ghost of an idea..."

As a director I have tried to be true to the spirit of Dickens' work and to maintain the three essential qualities that make it one of the great classics of the western canon. Thus, I hope what you will see tonight will be equal part ghost story, Christmas tradition, and social commentary.

Children's Theatre. Jessica has performed professionally in Pittsburgh, Columbus, Cincinnati, Cleveland, and with the ETA Hoffmann Theatre in Bamberg, Germany. At Greenbrier Valley Theatre in Lewisburg, WV she played Claire in Proof, Ariel in The Tempest, and Becky Lou in Free Mel Greenburg. She has been seen locally at Fairmont State's Town and Gown Players as Louise in Always... Patsy Cline, as Mrs. Mullin in West Virginia Public Theatre's Carousel, and as the Mom/Queen in The Unlucky Princess Battles the Ghouls and Amy in Putting it Together for WVU's Mountain State Repertory. Other favorite roles include Kent in King Lear, Roberta in Danny and the Deep Blue Sea, Yitzhak in Hedwig and the Angry Inch, the Angel in Angels in America, Part Two: Perestroika, and Jess in Complete Works of Wm Shkspre (abridged).
