


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

DESIGNERS



Robert Klingelhoefer (Scenic Designer) is the Professor of Scenic Design and Director of the Design & Technology Program at West Virginia University where he has taught since 2005. He has designed four previous productions for WVPT since its reorganization and affiliation with WVU: Romeo & Juliet, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way on the Way to the Forum, Young Frankenstein, and Sylvia. This year he designs Peter and the Starcatcher, and Hatful of Rain. Professor Klingelhoefer continues his professional career of 40 years with recent work at the Walnut Street Theatre in Philadelphia, the Maine State MusicTheatre in Brunswick, ME,

and the Fulton Theatre in Lancaster, PA where he was the resident designer for 20 years. He also has extensive Off- and Off-Off-Broadway credits in New York where he was resident designer for two companies, Pan Asian Repertory Theatre and the Jean Cocteau Repertory Theatre. In February he designed the 2018 Galat for WVU Children's Hospital.



Alan McEwen (Lighting and Sound Designer) joined the School of Theatre & Dance in 2008. Previous work experience includes Whitman College, Idaho Repertory Theatre, Mountain State Theatre, Colorado Shakespeare Festival, Wyoming Summer Stock Theatre, and The Columbine Players. 
